<u>Kate Millett</u>, feminist and author, will speak at Ohio Wesleyan University April 15 at 8 p.m. Millett drew public attention after the publication of <u>Sexual Politics</u> in 1970 and was subsequently recognized as a radical and influential force in the Women's Movement. She has also written the autobiographical <u>Flying</u> and is editor of <u>The</u> <u>Prostitution Papers</u>.

NEWS ABOUT WOMEN AT DENISON

Nancy Nowik received her doctorate on March 19, 1976 from the Ohio State University. Nancy has been appointed a GLCA Faculty Development Fellow for 1976-77. She plans to investigate the problem of the reticent student, a large number of whom are women. Funds for the project will be used for interviews, seminars utilizing Gestalt therapy, videotapes, group reaction techniques and to sponsor a workshop for faculty.
