## ACADEMICAL DEPARTMENT.

This department of the Institution is open for the reception of any student of good moral character, and of a suitable age to be removed from the restraints of domestic life. It furnishes peculiar facilities for an extended and thorough English education. Grammar, Geography, Arithmetic, and other common English branches, are taught with great thoroughness; and when perfected in these, any student may pursue, in connection with classes in the Collegiate Department, all the higher Mathematical studies, Rhetoric, Intellectual and Moral Philosophy, Evidences of Christianity, Logic, Political Economy, &c. &c.; thus enjoying all the advantages of a liberal education, excepting only an acquaintance with the learned languages; and, although no diploma is given, yet, at the close of an extended course of English studies, the student is entitled to a certificate of his attainments, scholarship, and deportment, signed by the President of the College and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Those who intend to devote a part or all their time to teaching, or to engage in mercantile pursuits, or in any department of business, will find at this Institution all needed assistance in securing the necessary literary qualifications.

In this department are also taught the Elements of the Latin and Greek Languages, as preparatory to admission, in full, into the Collegiate Department. Peculiar attention is paid to the Pronunciation, Etymology, and the Syntax of these languages. The object is not to hurry pupils from one author to another, but to make them perfectly familiar, before entering College, with all the elementary principles. and thus at an early period in their literary course, forming a taste, a relish, for these languages.

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The Text Books used in this department, are Davies' Arithmetic, Mitchell's Geography, Well's English Grammar, Andrews' and Stoddard's Latin Grammar, Sophocles' Greek Lessons and Greek Grammar, Andrews' Latin Reader, Cæsar's Commentaries, Cicero's Select Orations, Virgil, Felton's Greek Reader, and Davies' First Lessons in Algebra.

## DISCIPLINE.

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The officers have their rooms in the College edifices, and visit the rooms of students twice or oftener each day; and, during hours appropriated to study, maintain quietness and good order in the halls and over the premises. They also keep a Register showing the absence of each student from all exercises upon which his attendance is required; also, the degree of excellence or deficiency of each performance, and his general deportment. This, if, requested, is, at the close of the term, transmitted to parents or guardians, and is open at all times to their inspection. They may thus be as well informed of the proficiency and conduct of their sons or wards, as if they were pursuing their studies under their own immediate supervision.

The laws enacted by the Trustees for regulating the internal affairs of the Institution, will at all times be enforced by the Faculty with firmness and impartiality. When kihdness and an appeal to honorable principles or private admonition will secure the end aimed at in these regulations, *they* will always be preferred and employed. But when these fail to influence any young man faithfully to improve his time and opportunities, his friends will be informed of his delinquencies, that he may be removed from the Institution, if possible, without public censure.

#### COMMENCEMENT AND VACATIONS.

The Commencement is held on the second Wednesday in July. In each year there are two terms of twenty-one weeks each, and two vacations—one of eight weeks, after Commencement, and one of two weeks at the close of the first term. During the next Collegiate year, (1849-'50,) the terms will begin as follows: The first term will commence September 6, and the second February 24. Those intending to become members, will do well to make their arrangements to be upon the ground promptly at the beginning of the term, and enrol themselves in classes which will then be formed.

#### LOCATION, & c.

The Institution is situated on a healthy and delightful eminence, on the Columbus road, about one mile West of the village of Granville, Licking county, Ohio. There are two College edifices, affording ample and pleasant accommodations for a large number of students.
