Course of Study.

Reading, Orthography, the Composition of Words, Penmanship, and exercises in Composi-tion, will be attended to taroughout the Course, and need not therefore be mentioned among the studies of each class.

PREPARATORY CLASS.

Mental and Written Arithmetic, English Grand mar and Geography completed.

FRESHMAN CLASS.

FIRST TERM .- Algebra 1st Part, Latin Grammar and U. S. History.

SECOND TERM,-Algebra 2d Part, Latin Granimar, Fables and Modern History.

THIRD TERM .- Algebra 2d Part Latin Grammar and Roman History, and Geography of the Heavens.

SOPHOMORE CLASS

FIRST TERM,-Green's Analysis, Casar and Ancient History. SECOND TERM. Familiar Science, Virgil and

Physiology. THIRD TERM .- Natural Philosophy, Virgil and Botsny.

JUNIOR CLASS.

FIRST TERM .- Geometry, Sallust & Chemistry. SECOND TERM .- Geometry, Cicero and Retoric. THIRD TERM,-Trigonometry, Cicero & Kames.

SENIOR CLASS.

FIRST TELM .- Natural Theology, Alexander's Evidences of Christianity and Geology. SECOND TERM .- Astronomy, Logic and 3 oral Science.

THIRD TERM .- Butler's Analogy and Intellectual Philosophy. The Scientific Course is completed in three years.

Text Books.

Rhetorical Exercises.

The School is separated into three sections, and each section under a separate teacher spends 45 minutes of each day after chapel seavice, in impromptu composition, and other rhetorical exercises, besides the usual compositions once in two weeks

Daily exercise is kept up eitler in walking, or with Dr. Dio Lewis' gymnastics.

Books and Stationery will be furnished for cash at Cincinnati prices

Location.

The Institute is in the center of the State, in one of the most beautiful and healthy regions of the West. The country is beautifully diversified with hill and valley. The town is in a valley surrounded by hills, presenting one of the loveliest pictures in nature

Denison University, by ing located here, has given a literary cast to society, which cannot laid to inspire ambition for excellence in scholarship, especially as the pupils are brought into competition with students of the other sex pursuing the same

studies, and using the same text-books.
Granville is in Licking ('ounty, 3½ miles from Union Station. on the Central Ohio Railroad, and six miles from Newark, from each of which places' hacks run to Granville upon the arrival of the trains.

AIMS.

It is the decided purpose of the Faculty to make good scholars, and PRACTICAL WOMEN. We hope to avoid the errors to which female schools are liable, (or rather, perhaps, with which they are charged) of making drawing-room ornaments merely.

We shall endeavor to cultivate the graces of behavior through the affections. We shall insist on thorough preparation for every leason, strict observance of the hours of study, promptness at recitations and at chapel, and regular attendance at church (the church chosen by parents or guardians.)

BUILDINGS.

The buildings are sufficient to accommodate the teachers and about fifty boarding pupils, with all necessary recitation rooms, library, apparatus, music and painting rooms. They are surrounded by ample and beautiful grounds, and turnish a delightful home for the inmates of the school.

LIBRARY.

A library has already been established, to which accessious are constantly made, by an arrangement with the Board of the University, the pupils of the Institute can draw from that ample collection.

APPARATUS.

The Institute is provided with apparatus for llustrating the most important facts in Natural science, and new articles will be added to meet the necessities of the classes.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are two flourishing Societies, the Euterpean and Philomathean. meeting Friday evening each week, which are doing much to stimulate and cultivate the literary spirit,

ADMISSION.

Prplis will be received at any time, and assigned places in classes for which they are prepared. It is, however, very desirable that they should enter at the beginning of the term, and continue to the end. No deduction from bills will be made for a lew days' absence at the beginning or end of the term, A few days' board and tuition are not to be compared with the derangement of classes or the unsuccessful pursuit or studies, under the disadvantage of having passed superficially over elementary principles.

DIPLOMAS.

Will be awarded to such as have completed the regular course, and also to such as complete the highist course, each indicating the course pursue at Certificates will be given to such as pursue an eclectic course, indicating the studies completed.

Graduates will be required to have a standing of at least eighty per cent. in the studies of the courses, and a goo! moral character.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. No pupil will be received, except by special arrangement at the time of entering, for less than a term, or the remainder of the term in which she enters, and no deduction will be made for absence except from protracted sicknes, in which case the loss will be shared equally with the patron.

 Each young lady should bring an umbrella, a pair of thick-soled shoes, or overshoes, napking, towels, sheets and pillow-cases, and comfort, or an

equivalent of quilts or blankets.

3. It is very desirable that pupils should be provided with all needful clothing for the term, to prevent interruption of study in providing them.

4. Occupants of rooms will be held responsible

for all damage to room or furniture.

5. Patrons are requested to insist on frugality in expenses, and n-t to send sweetmeats, candit-so or confections to their daughters, as they are almost always eaten just before retiring, and are the cause of serious interruption in study. The teachers and pupils board at the same table, where there will always be ample supplies of wholesome food, and consequently there is no necessity for parents to send rich pastries, which will be eiten to the hart of the health of both the body and mind of the pupil.

6. Liberal deductions will be made in the bills of the daughters of pastors, and persons of limited

means, according to circumstances.

BY-LAWS.

1. Students will make no change of rooms or seats at table, without the consent of the Faculty.

2. Students from abroad will be expected to board in the Seminary, unless special arrangements are made with the President. Many evils are liable to arise from the choice of surroundings by the pupil, or by parents who are strangers to the influences to which the pupil will be subjected. The President must have the right to determine so important a matter.

3. No student will take up or drop a study with-

out the consent of the Faculty.

4. Students are not allowed to make or receive visits on the Sabbath.

TERMS AND VACATIONS.

The year is divided into three terms; The first (twelve weeks) beginning September

3d, 1868 followed by a vacation of one week.
The second beginning December 3d, 1868 (thir-

teen weeks) followed by a vacation of 2 weeks.
The third beginning Thursday, March 18 1869,
(fourteen weeks) ending June 24, 1869, followed

by a vacation of ten weeks.
